## Compiled Military Service Records

The military service records of the men who fought in the Revolutionary War are fragmentary because many of the original records were lost in a fire in the office of the Secretary of War in 1800. Others were destroyed in 1814 when the British Armyramsacked and burned government buildings.

A compiled military service record is a card file of information about a soildier collected from muster rolls, retutns, hospital registers, and other records. The cards are arranged by State, thereunder by military unit, and then alphabetically by surmane. These have been indexed and microfilmed.

Here is the information from three cards in the file of Jacob Mummy, other cards gave no additional information. Compare this information with the story about him found inin a book of the Bittner Werley Families written by The Rev. Jacob Bittner in 1930.

"Jacob Mummy from Seiberlingsville was Capt. of a regiment formed in Weisenburg Twp.. They went to New York, joined the Army of Washington They fought in the battle of Long Island, under General Sterling. Many of them were captured after the defeat, among them being Jacob Mummy. He with others was imprisoned in a church and later on a ship, where he died."

I could find no indication in the records that he died while a prisoner. There was no pension application which there should have been if he died leaving a wife and minor children.

Other Mummas in this file are: Christopher Mummy drafted in Ohio County Va. 19 March 1773, also on a list dated May 1778

The following were all in the German Battalion of the Continental Troops.

Christian Mumma, vt. enlisted 18 June 1778

July 1778 Camp White Planes, sick in hospital
Died 27 July 1778.

David Mumma, pvt. enlisted 20 July 1776, April 1778 Vally Forge, May 1778 Hd. Quarters Vally Forge, on command with the butchers. July and Aug 1778 Camp White planes, Sept.and Oct.1778 Camp Fishill. Discharged 20 June 1780.

William Mumert, pvt. enlisted 25 April 1778 May 1778, Vally Forge, June 1778 Camp Second River, Sept.and Oct. 1778 Camp Fishill Last pay Dec. 1780.

The only one of these men found in the pension rolls is Christopher. In the pension records we get much more information.

## Revolutionary War Pension Applications

At first pensions for Revolutionary soldiers was limited to those disabled in service, and to the dependents of those killed in service or who died as a result of service. In 1818 Congress provided that every person who served in the Revolutionary War for 9 months or until the end of the war and who was in need of assistance from his country for support should be pensioned.

We will not find many ancestors in this group for if they had a

family they would have been expected to care for the parents.

I found the application of one John Moomy filed in Pickaway Co. OH 20 March 1829. He was then 76 years of age (b. ca. 1753) his wife was soon to be 76. He had no family. He enlisted from the state of Maryland in Dec.1776 for a term of three years or during the war. He continued to serve until after the battle of Brandywine in the autumn of 1777, when he was captured by a mumber of British light horse at Swedes Fork while he was standing sentinel and he was taken to Philadelipha as a prisoner of war. When the British left that city before the battle of Monmouth he escaped from them and not knowing where his company was in the southern states he returned to his home near the Blue mountains in Maryland and was married.

In 1832 Congress passed an act that removed the requirement of need. By this time the veterns were quite old and many were dead. Christopher Mummy filed at this time giving considerable information about himself.

He was born 2 Apr. 1753 at Germantown, within seven miles of Philadelphia. At the time of his entry into service he was living in what "is now called Brooke Co. Va." (now W.Va.) The commanded by Captain Samuel Teeter and Lieutenent George McConnel in the Virginia Line. I with the troops to which I belonged, consisting of about nine hundred men-to wit three hundred regulars-two companies of volunteers and the balance militia all under the command of Col. Broadhead and Lt. Col. Gibson rendevoused at Fort Pitt.

"We marched to the Munsee towrs on the Alleganey River about two hundred miles above Fort Pitt.We there distroyed the towns after routing the Indians.We also destroyed nearly three hundred acres of corn. Killed several Indians, took a large quanity ofscalping knives and plough irons and other property not now recolected. We were gon on this expedition about six weeks when we marched back to Fort Pitt, and from there we went into blockade forts for the purpose of guarding the frontier settlements. I was stationed at Well's Fort situated on

After the war he lived "part of the time on a farm belonging to Francis McGuire that was divided by the line between Virginia and Pennslyvania, and which lies in Brooke Co. Va. and Washington Co. Pa. a part of my time on each side the line. Thense to Alexander Wells farm in Brooke Co. Va. And from there to Harrison Co. Ohio where I lived eight years and from thense to Morgan Co. Ohio my present residence where I have lived about eight years."

There was also an application from a Jacob Mummy of Columbia County Pa. He said he was born January 1st 1763 at Chestnut Hill 1 mile from Philadelphia in Berks Co. Pa.He was living in Amity township, Berks County when he entered the service as a substitute for Henry Switzer.
